AMENDING SECTIONS 15-341, 15-816 AND 15-816.01, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES; RELATING TO SCHOOL ENROLLMENT.

1 Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Arizona: 2 Section 1. Section 15-341, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to 3 read: 4 15-341. General powers and duties; immunity; delegation 5 The governing board shall: Α. 6 1. Prescribe and enforce policies and procedures for the governance 7 σf TO GOVERN the schools that are not inconsistent with law or rules 8 prescribed by the state board of education. 9 2. Exclude from schools all books, publications, papers or materials of a sectarian, partisan or denominational 10 audiovisual 11 character. This paragraph does not prohibit the elective course permitted 12 by section 15-717.01. 13 3. Manage and control the school property within its district, except that a district may enter into a partnership with an entity, 14 including a charter school, another school district or a military base, to 15 16 operate a school or offer educational services in a district building, 17 including at a vacant or partially used building, or in any building on 18 the entity's property pursuant to a written agreement between the parties. 19 4. Acquire school furniture, apparatus, equipment, library books 20 and supplies for the use of the schools TO USE. 5. Prescribe the curricula and criteria for the promotion and 21 22 graduation of pupils as provided in sections 15-701 and 15-701.01. 6. Furnish, repair and insure, at full insurable value, the school 23 24 property of the district. 25 7. Construct school buildings on approval by a vote of the district 26 electors. 27 8. Make In the name of the district, conveyances of CONVEY property belonging to the district and sold by the board. 28 29 9. Purchase school sites when authorized by a vote of the district at an election conducted as nearly as practicable in the same manner as 30 31 the election provided in section 15-481 and held on a date prescribed in section 15-491, subsection E, but such authorization shall not necessarily 32 specify the site to be purchased and such authorization shall not be 33 34 necessary to exchange unimproved property as provided in section 15-342, 35 paragraph 23. 36 10. Construct, improve and furnish buildings used for school 37 purposes when such buildings or premises are leased from the national park 38 service. 11. Purchase school sites or construct, improve and furnish school 39 40 buildings from the proceeds of the sale of school property only on 41 approval by a vote of the district electors. 42 12. Hold pupils to strict account for disorderly conduct on school 43 property. 13. Discipline students for disorderly conduct on the way to and 44 45 from school.

1 14. Except as provided in section 15-1224, deposit all monies 2 received by the district as gifts, grants and devises with the county 3 treasurer who shall credit the deposits as designated in the uniform 4 system of financial records. If not inconsistent with the terms of the 5 gifts, grants and devises given, any balance remaining after expenditures 6 for the intended purpose of the monies have been made shall be used for 7 reduction of school district taxes for the budget year, except that in the 8 case of accommodation schools the county treasurer shall carry the balance 9 forward for use by the county school superintendent for accommodation 10 schools for the budget year.

11 15. Provide that, if a parent or legal guardian chooses not to 12 accept a decision of the teacher as provided in paragraph 42 of this 13 subsection, the parent or legal guardian may request in writing that the 14 governing board review the teacher's decision. This paragraph does not 15 release school districts from any liability relating to a child's 16 promotion or retention.

17 16. Provide for adequate supervision over pupils in instructional 18 and noninstructional activities by certificated or noncertificated 19 personnel.

20 17. Use school monies received from the state and county school 21 apportionment exclusively for payment of TO PAY salaries of teachers and 22 other employees and contingent expenses of the district.

18. Make an annual ANNUALLY report to the county school superintendent on or before October 1 in the manner and form and on the blanks prescribed by the superintendent of public instruction or county school superintendent. The board shall also make reports directly to the county school superintendent or the superintendent of public instruction whenever required.

19. Deposit all monies received by school districts other than student activities monies or monies from auxiliary operations as provided in sections 15-1125 and 15-1126 with the county treasurer to the credit of the school district except as provided in paragraph 20 of this subsection and sections 15-1223 and 15-1224, and the board shall expend the monies as provided by law for other school funds.

20. Establish bank accounts in which the board during a month may deposit miscellaneous monies received directly by the district. The board shall remit monies deposited in the bank accounts at least monthly to the county treasurer for deposit as provided in paragraph 19 of this subsection and in accordance with the uniform system of financial records.

40 21. Prescribe and enforce policies and procedures for disciplinary 41 action against a teacher who engages in conduct that is a violation of the 42 policies of the governing board but that is not cause for dismissal of the 43 teacher or for revocation of the certificate of the teacher. Disciplinary 44 action may include suspension without pay for a period of time not to 45 exceed ten school days. Disciplinary action shall not include suspension 1 with pay or suspension without pay for a period of time longer than ten 2 school days. The procedures shall include notice, hearing and appeal 3 provisions for violations that are cause for disciplinary action. The 4 governing board may designate a person or persons to act on behalf of the 5 board on these matters.

6 22. Prescribe and enforce policies and procedures for disciplinary 7 action against an administrator who engages in conduct that is a violation 8 of the policies of the governing board regarding duties of administrators 9 but that is not cause for dismissal of the administrator or for revocation of the certificate of the administrator. Disciplinary action may include 10 11 suspension without pay for a period of time not to exceed ten school days. 12 Disciplinary action shall not include suspension with pay or suspension 13 without pay for a period of time longer than ten school days. The 14 procedures shall include notice, hearing and appeal provisions for violations that are cause for disciplinary action. The governing board 15 16 may designate a person or persons to act on behalf of the board on these 17 matters. For violations that are cause for dismissal, the provisions of 18 notice, hearing and appeal in chapter 5, article 3 of this title shall 19 apply. The filing of a timely request for a hearing suspends the 20 imposition of a suspension without pay or a dismissal pending completion 21 of the hearing.

22 23. Notwithstanding sections 13-3108 and 13-3120, prescribe and 23 enforce policies and procedures that prohibit a person from carrying or 24 possessing a weapon on school grounds unless the person is a peace officer 25 or has obtained specific authorization from the school administrator.

26 24. Prescribe and enforce policies and procedures relating to the 27 health and safety of all pupils participating in district-sponsored 28 practice sessions or games or other interscholastic athletic activities, 29 including:

- 30
- (a) The provision of water.

31 (b) Guidelines, information and forms, developed in consultation 32 statewide private entity that supervises interscholastic with а activities, to inform and educate coaches, pupils and parents of the 33 dangers of concussions and head injuries and the risks of continued 34 35 participation in athletic activity after a concussion. The policies and 36 procedures shall require that, before a pupil participates in an athletic 37 activity, the pupil and the pupil's parent must sign an information form at least once each school year that states that the parent is aware of the 38 39 nature and risk of concussion. The policies and procedures shall require 40 that a pupil who is suspected of sustaining a concussion in a practice 41 session, game or other interscholastic athletic activity be immediately 42 removed from the athletic activity and that the pupil's parent or guardian 43 be notified. A coach from the pupil's team or an official or a licensed health care provider may remove a pupil from play. A team parent may also 44 45 remove the parent's own child from play. A pupil may return to play on

1 the same day if a health care provider rules out a suspected concussion at 2 the time the pupil is removed from play. On a subsequent day, the pupil 3 may return to play if the pupil has been evaluated by and received written 4 clearance to resume participation in athletic activity from a health care 5 provider who has been trained in the evaluation and management of 6 concussions and head injuries. A health care provider who is a volunteer 7 and who provides clearance to participate in athletic activity on the day 8 of the suspected injury or on a subsequent day is immune from civil 9 liability with respect to all decisions made and actions taken that are on good faith implementation of the requirements 10 based of this 11 subdivision, except in cases of gross negligence or wanton or wilful 12 neglect. A school district, school district employee, team coach. 13 official or team volunteer or a parent or guardian of a team member is not subject to civil liability for any act, omission or policy undertaken in 14 good faith to comply with the requirements of this subdivision or for a 15 16 decision made or an action taken by a health care provider. A group or 17 organization that uses property or facilities owned or operated by a 18 school district for athletic activities shall comply with the requirements 19 of this subdivision. A school district and its employees and volunteers 20 are not subject to civil liability for any other person or organization's 21 failure or alleged failure to comply with the requirements of this 22 subdivision. This subdivision does not apply to teams that are based in 23 another state and that participate in an athletic activity in this state. 24 For the purposes of this subdivision, athletic activity does not include 25 dance, rhythmic gymnastics, competitions or exhibitions of academic skills 26 or knowledge or other similar forms of physical noncontact activities, 27 civic activities or academic activities, whether engaged in for the 28 purposes of competition or recreation. For the purposes of this 29 subdivision, "health care provider" means a physician who is licensed pursuant to title 32, chapter 13 or 17, an athletic trainer who is 30 31 licensed pursuant to title 32, chapter 41, a nurse practitioner who is 32 licensed pursuant to title 32, chapter 15, and a physician assistant who 33 is licensed pursuant to title 32, chapter 25.

34 (c) Guidelines, information and forms that are developed in 35 consultation with а statewide private entity that supervises 36 interscholastic activities to inform and educate coaches, pupils and 37 parents of the dangers of heat-related illnesses, sudden cardiac death and 38 prescription opioid use. Before а pupil participates in any 39 district-sponsored practice session or game or other interscholastic 40 athletic activity, the pupil and the pupil's parent must be provided with 41 information at least once each school year on the risks of heat-related 42 illnesses, sudden cardiac death and prescription opioid addiction.

43 25. Establish an assessment, data gathering and reporting system as
44 prescribed in chapter 7, article 3 of this title.

1 26. Provide special education programs and related services 2 pursuant to section 15–764, subsection A to all children with disabilities 3 as defined in section 15–761.

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27. Administer competency tests prescribed by the state board of education for the graduation of pupils from high school.

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6 28. Ensure that insurance coverage is secured for all construction 7 projects for purposes of general liability, property damage and workers' 8 compensation and secure performance and payment bonds for all construction 9 projects.

10 Keep in the personnel file of all current and former employees 29. 11 who provide instruction to pupils at a school information about the employee's educational and teaching background and experience in a 12 13 particular academic content subject area. A school district shall inform parents and guardians of the availability of the information and shall 14 15 make the information available for inspection on request of parents and 16 guardians of pupils enrolled at a school. This paragraph does not require 17 any school to release personally identifiable information in relation to 18 any teacher or employee, including the teacher's or employee's address, 19 salary, social security number or telephone number.

20 30. Report to local law enforcement agencies any suspected crime 21 against a person or property that is a serious offense as defined in 22 section 13-706 or that involves a deadly weapon or dangerous instrument or serious physical injury and any conduct that poses a threat of death or 23 24 serious physical injury to employees, students or anyone on the property of the school. This paragraph does not limit or preclude the reporting by 25 26 a school district or an employee of a school district of suspected crimes other than those required to be reported by this paragraph. For the 27 purposes of this paragraph, "dangerous instrument", "deadly weapon" and 28 "serious physical injury" have the same meanings prescribed in section 29 30 13-105.

31 31. In conjunction with local law enforcement agencies and 32 emergency response agencies, develop an emergency response plan for each 33 school in the school district in accordance with minimum standards 34 developed jointly by the department of education and the division of 35 emergency management within the department of emergency and military 36 affairs.

37 Provide written notice to the parents or guardians of all 32. students enrolled in the school district at least ten days before a public 38 39 meeting to discuss closing a school within the school district. The 40 notice shall include the reasons for the proposed closure and the time and 41 place of the meeting. The governing board shall fix a time for a public 42 meeting on the proposed closure not less than ten days before voting in a 43 public meeting to close the school. The school district governing board shall give notice of the time and place of the meeting. At the time and 44 45 place designated in the notice, the school district governing board shall

1 hear reasons for or against closing the school. The school district 2 governing board is exempt from this paragraph if the governing board 3 determines that the school shall be closed because it poses a danger to 4 the health or safety of the pupils or employees of the school. A 5 governing board may consult with the school facilities board for technical 6 assistance and for information on the impact of closing a school. The 7 information provided from the school facilities board shall not require 8 the governing board to take or not take any action.

9 33. Incorporate instruction on Native American history into 10 appropriate existing curricula.

34. Prescribe and enforce policies and procedures:

12 (a) Allowing pupils who have been diagnosed with anaphylaxis by a 13 health care provider licensed pursuant to title 32, chapter 13, 14, 17 or 25 or by a registered nurse practitioner licensed and certified pursuant 14 15 title 32, chapter 15 to carry and self-administer emergency to 16 medications, including epinephrine auto-injectors, while at school and at 17 school-sponsored activities. The pupil's name on the prescription label 18 on the medication container or on the medication device and annual written 19 documentation from the pupil's parent or guardian to the school that 20 authorizes possession and self-administration is sufficient proof that the 21 pupil is entitled to the possession and self-administration of the 22 medication. The policies shall require a pupil who uses an epinephrine auto-injector while at school and at school-sponsored activities to notify 23 24 the nurse or the designated school staff person of the use of the 25 medication as soon as practicable. A school district and its employees 26 are immune from civil liability with respect to all decisions made and 27 actions taken that are based on good faith implementation of the requirements of this subdivision, except in cases of wanton or wilful 28 29 neglect.

30 (b) For the emergency administration of epinephrine auto-injectors 31 by a trained employee of a school district pursuant to section 15-157.

35. Allow the possession and self-administration of prescription 32 33 medication for breathing disorders in handheld inhaler devices by pupils who have been prescribed that medication by a health care professional 34 licensed pursuant to title 32. The pupil's name on the prescription label 35 36 on the medication container or on the handheld inhaler device and annual 37 written documentation from the pupil's parent or guardian to the school that authorizes possession and self-administration shall be sufficient 38 proof that the pupil is entitled to the possession and self-administration 39 40 of the medication. A school district and its employees are immune from 41 civil liability with respect to all decisions made and actions taken that are based on a good faith implementation of the requirements of this 42 43 paragraph.

44 36. Prescribe and enforce policies and procedures to prohibit 45 pupils from harassing, intimidating and bullying other pupils on school 1 grounds, on school property, on school buses, at school bus stops, at 2 school-sponsored events and activities and through the use of electronic 3 technology or electronic communication on school computers, networks, 4 forums and mailing lists that include the following components:

5 (a) A procedure for pupils, parents and school district employees 6 to confidentially report to school officials incidents of harassment, 7 intimidation or bullying. The school shall make available written forms 8 designed to provide a full and detailed description of the incident and 9 any other relevant information about the incident.

10 (b) A requirement that school district employees report in writing 11 suspected incidents of harassment, intimidation or bullying to the 12 appropriate school official and a description of appropriate disciplinary 13 procedures for employees who fail to report suspected incidents that are 14 known to the employee.

15 (c) A requirement that, at the beginning of each school year, 16 school officials provide all pupils with a written copy of the rights, 17 protections and support services available to a pupil who is an alleged 18 victim of an incident reported pursuant to this paragraph.

(d) If an incident is reported pursuant to this paragraph, a requirement that school officials provide a pupil who is an alleged victim of the incident with a written copy of the rights, protections and support services available to that pupil.

23 (e) A formal process for the documentation of reported incidents of 24 harassment, intimidation or bullying and for the confidentiality, maintenance and disposition of this documentation. 25 School districts shall 26 maintain documentation of all incidents reported pursuant to this 27 paragraph for at least six years. The school shall not use that documentation to impose disciplinary action unless the appropriate school 28 29 official has investigated and determined that the reported incidents of harassment, intimidation or bullying occurred. If a school provides 30 31 documentation of reported incidents to persons other than school officials 32 or law enforcement, all individually identifiable information shall be 33 redacted.

(f) A formal process for the investigation by the appropriate school officials of suspected incidents of harassment, intimidation or bullying, including procedures for notifying the alleged victim and the alleged victim's parent or guardian when a school official or employee becomes aware of the suspected incident of harassment, intimidation or bullying.

40 (g) Disciplinary procedures for pupils who have admitted or been 41 found to have committed incidents of harassment, intimidation or bullying.

42 (h) A procedure that sets forth consequences for submitting false43 reports of incidents of harassment, intimidation or bullying.

1 (i) Procedures designed to protect the health and safety of pupils 2 who are physically harmed as the result of incidents of harassment, 3 intimidation and bullying, including, if appropriate, procedures to 4 contact emergency medical services or law enforcement agencies, or both.

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(j) Definitions of harassment, intimidation and bullying.

6 37. Prescribe and enforce policies and procedures regarding 7 changing or adopting attendance boundaries that include the following 8 components:

9 (a) A procedure for holding public meetings to discuss attendance 10 boundary changes or adoptions that allows public comments.

(b) A procedure to notify the parents or guardians of the students
 affected, INCLUDING ASSURANCE THAT STUDENTS ASSIGNED TO A NEW ATTENDANCE
 AREA MAY STAY ENROLLED IN THEIR CURRENT SCHOOL IF THAT SCHOOL REMAINS OPEN
 AS PART OF THE BOUNDARY CHANGE AND CAPACITY IS AVAILABLE.

15 (c) A procedure to notify the residents of the households affected 16 by the attendance boundary changes.

17 (d) A process for placing public meeting notices and proposed maps
18 on the school district's website for public review, if the school district
19 maintains a website.

20 (e) A formal process for presenting the attendance boundaries of 21 the affected area in public meetings that allows public comments.

(f) A formal process for notifying the residents and parents or guardians of the affected area as to the decision of the governing board on the school district's website, if the school district maintains a website.

(g) A formal process for updating attendance boundaries on the school district's website within ninety days of AFTER an adopted boundary change. The school district shall send a direct link to the school district's attendance boundaries website to the department of real estate.

30 38. If the state board of education determines that the school 31 district has committed an overexpenditure as defined in section 15-107, 32 provide a copy of the fiscal management report submitted pursuant to 33 section 15-107, subsection H on its website and make copies available to 34 the public on request. The school district shall comply with a request 35 within five business days after receipt.

36 39. Ensure that the contract for the superintendent is structured 37 in a manner in which up to twenty percent of the total annual salary 38 included for the superintendent in the contract is classified as 39 performance pay. This paragraph does not require school districts to 40 increase total compensation for superintendents. Unless the school 41 district governing board votes to implement an alternative procedure at a 42 public meeting called for this purpose, the performance pay portion of the 43 superintendent's total annual compensation shall be determined as follows:

44 (a) Twenty-five percent of the performance pay shall be determined 45 based on the percentage of academic gain determined by the department of

1 education of pupils who are enrolled in the school district compared to 2 the academic gain achieved by the highest ranking of the fifty largest 3 school districts in this state. For the purposes of this subdivision, the 4 department of education shall determine academic gain by the academic 5 growth achieved by each pupil who has been enrolled at the same school in 6 a school district for at least five consecutive months measured against 7 that pupil's academic results in the 2008-2009 school year. For the 8 purposes of this subdivision, of the fifty largest school districts in 9 this state, the school district with pupils who demonstrate the highest statewide percentage of overall academic gain measured against academic 10 11 results for the 2008-2009 school year shall be assigned a score of 100 and 12 the school district with pupils who demonstrate the lowest statewide 13 percentage of overall academic gain measured against academic results for the 2008-2009 school year shall be assigned a score of 0. 14

15 (b) Twenty-five percent of the performance pay shall be determined 16 by the percentage of parents of pupils who are enrolled at the school district who assign a letter grade of "A" to the school on a survey of 17 18 parental satisfaction with the school district. The parental satisfaction survey shall be administered and scored by an independent entity that is 19 20 selected by the governing board and that demonstrates sufficient expertise 21 and experience to accurately measure the results of the survey. The 22 parental satisfaction survey shall use standard random sampling procedures 23 and provide anonymity and confidentiality to each parent who participates 24 in the survey. The letter grade scale used on the parental satisfaction 25 survey shall direct parents to assign one of the following letter grades:

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(i) A letter grade of "A" if the school district is excellent.(ii) A letter grade of "B" if the school district is above average.

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29 30 (iii) A letter grade of "C" if the school district is average.(iv) A letter grade of "D" if the school district is below average.

(v) A letter grade of "F" if the school district is a failure.

31 (c) Twenty-five percent of the performance pay shall be determined 32 by the percentage of teachers who are employed at the school district and who assign a letter grade of "A" to the school on a survey of teacher 33 34 satisfaction with the school. The teacher satisfaction survey shall be 35 administered and scored by an independent entity that is selected by the 36 governing board and that demonstrates sufficient expertise and experience 37 to accurately measure the results of the survey. The teacher satisfaction 38 survey shall use standard random sampling procedures and provide anonymity 39 and confidentiality to each teacher who participates in the survey. The 40 letter grade scale used on the teacher satisfaction survey shall direct 41 teachers to assign one of the following letter grades:

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44 45 (i) A letter grade of "A" if the school district is excellent.

(ii) A letter grade of "B" if the school district is above average.

(iii) A letter grade of "C" if the school district is average.

(iv) A letter grade of "D" if the school district is below average.

- (v) A letter grade of "F" if the school district is a failure.

(d) Twenty-five percent of the performance pay shall be determined by other criteria selected by the governing board.

4 40. Maintain and store permanent public records of the school 5 required by law. Notwithstanding section 39-101, district as the 6 standards adopted by the Arizona state library, archives and public 7 records for the maintenance and storage of school district public records 8 shall allow school districts to elect to satisfy the requirements of this 9 paragraph by maintaining and storing these records either on paper or in an electronic format, or a combination of a paper and electronic format. 10

41. Adopt in a public meeting and implement policies for principal evaluations. Before adopting principal evaluation policies, the school district governing board shall provide opportunities for public discussion on the proposed policies. The governing board shall adopt policies that:

15 (a) Are designed to improve principal performance and improve 16 student achievement.

17 (b) Include the use of quantitative data on the academic progress 18 for all students, which shall account for between twenty percent and 19 thirty-three percent of the evaluation outcomes.

(c) Include four performance classifications, designated as highly
 effective, effective, developing and ineffective.

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(d) Describe both of the following:

(i) The methods used to evaluate the performance of principals,
 including the data used to measure student performance and job
 effectiveness.

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(ii) The formula used to determine evaluation outcomes.

27 42. Prescribe and enforce policies and procedures that define the duties of principals and teachers. These policies and procedures shall 28 29 authorize teachers to take and maintain daily classroom attendance, make 30 the decision to promote or retain a pupil in a grade in common school or 31 to pass or fail a pupil in a course in high school, subject to review by 32 the governing board in the manner provided in section 15-342, 33 paragraph 11.

34 43. Prescribe and enforce policies and procedures for the emergency
35 administration by an employee of a school district pursuant to section
36 36-2267 of naloxone hydrochloride or any other opioid antagonist approved
37 by the United States food and drug administration.

38 44. In addition to the notification requirements prescribed in 39 paragraph 36 of this subsection, prescribe and enforce reasonable and appropriate policies to notify a pupil's parent or guardian if any person 40 41 engages in harassing, threatening or intimidating conduct against that 42 pupil. A school district and its officials and employees are immune from 43 civil liability with respect to all decisions made and actions taken that 44 are based on good faith implementation of the requirements of this 45 paragraph, except in cases of gross negligence or wanton or wilful

1 neglect. A person engages in threatening or intimidating if the person 2 threatens or intimidates by word or conduct to cause physical injury to 3 another person or serious damage to the property of another on school 4 grounds. A person engages in harassment if, with intent to harass or with 5 knowledge that the person is harassing another person, the person 6 anonymously or otherwise contacts, communicates or causes a communication 7 with another person by verbal, electronic, mechanical, telephonic or 8 written means in a manner that harasses on school grounds or substantially 9 disrupts the school environment.

B. Notwithstanding subsection A, paragraphs 7, 9 and 11 of this section, the county school superintendent may construct, improve and furnish school buildings or purchase or sell school sites in the conduct of an accommodation school.

14 C. If any school district acquires real or personal property, 15 whether by purchase, exchange, condemnation, gift or otherwise, the 16 governing board shall pay to the county treasurer any taxes on the 17 property that were unpaid as of the date of acquisition, including 18 penalties and interest. The lien for unpaid delinquent taxes, penalties 19 and interest on property acquired by a school district:

20 1. Is not abated, extinguished, discharged or merged in the title 21 to the property.

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2. Is enforceable in the same manner as other delinquent tax liens.

D. The governing board may not locate a school on property that is 23 24 less than one-fourth mile from agricultural land regulated pursuant to section 3-365, except that the owner of the agricultural land may agree to 25 26 comply with the buffer zone requirements of section 3-365. If the owner agrees in writing to comply with the buffer zone requirements and records 27 28 the agreement in the office of the county recorder as a restrictive 29 covenant running with the title to the land, the school district may locate a school within the affected buffer zone. The agreement may 30 31 include any stipulations regarding the school, including conditions for 32 future expansion of the school and changes in the operational status of the school that will result in a breach of the agreement. 33

E. A school district, its governing board members, its school council members and its employees are immune from civil liability for the consequences of adoption and implementation of policies and procedures pursuant to subsection A of this section and section 15-342. This waiver does not apply if the school district, its governing board members, its school council members or its employees are guilty of gross negligence or intentional misconduct.

41 F. A governing board may delegate in writing to a superintendent, 42 principal or head teacher the authority to prescribe procedures that are 43 consistent with the governing board's policies.

44 G. Notwithstanding any other provision of this title, a school 45 district governing board shall not take any action that would result in a

1 reduction of pupil square footage unless the governing board notifies the 2 school facilities board established by section 15-2001 of the proposed 3 action and receives written approval from the school facilities board to 4 take the action. A reduction includes an increase in administrative space 5 that results in a reduction of pupil square footage or sale of school 6 sites or buildings, or both. A reduction includes a reconfiguration of 7 grades that results in a reduction of pupil square footage of any grade 8 level. This subsection does not apply to temporary reconfiguration of 9 school construction if grades to accommodate new the temporary reconfiguration does not exceed one year. The sale of equipment that 10 11 results in a reduction that falls below the equipment requirements 12 prescribed in section 15-2011, subsection B is subject to commensurate 13 withholding of school district district additional assistance monies pursuant to the direction of the school facilities board. 18 H. Subsections C through G of this section apply to a county board 19 of supervisors and a county school superintendent when operating and 20 administering an accommodation school.

I. A school district governing board may delegate authority in writing to the superintendent of the school district to submit plans for new school facilities to the school facilities board for the purpose of certifying that the plans meet the minimum school facility adequacy guidelines prescribed in section 15-2011.
